Subject: Arts & Crafts Furniture

Speaker: Gregory Paolini

Workshop: Sat/Sun Feb. 13th & 14th

Gregory Paolini designs and creates some of the finest furniture in the world from a small workshop, nestled in the mountains of Western North Carolina. His work has been featured in numerous books, magazines, and newspapers, including the preeminent Fine Woodworking Magazine. In addition to making sawdust and wood shavings, Greg has authored freelance articles and advice columns for several publications, including Woodwork, Fine Woodworking, and Cabinetmaker magazines and has recently completed a book published by Taunton.

Born and raised in Buffalo, NY, Gregory began woodworking after inheriting some hand tools, and built his first piece of furniture when exposed to the world of precision woodworking through a pattern making class in high school during the mid-eighties. Gregory explains: "I was blessed in a way - I had hand tools but couldn't afford power tools. I was forced to learn traditional, old world craftsmanship: Hand planing, joinery,

dovetailing. I salvaged wood from pallets and where ever I could, put into practice the techniques I learned

Today, Gregory expands upon his woodworking knowledge by continuously pushing his designs to the next level, and new horizons, while keeping a mindful eye of the details. "I pay a lot of attention to the little things – I've come to realize that often it is the smallest things that make the biggest difference."

Gregory closed with the following philosophy: " I accept that no man's work will ever be perfect, but it's my responsibility to craft each piece as close to perfect as my creator will allow."

Greg has a particular affinity with Arts & Crafts furniture and has a well earned reputation in that field. He will discuss his design and construction techniques in depth at the Friday meeting and during the week end workshop will demonstrate the various joinery (Through Tennons, Tusk Tennons, etc.) and techniques he uses on those pieces of furniture. If time permits Greg will build a small piece of furniture incorporating these construction methods.

Because of the enormous number of jigs that had been brought in by Bruce Wrenn and other members of the club, Mike said he would dispense with all but the most important of the club business. Mike did take a few minutes remind everyone that next months meeting would be held on Friday February 12. Gregory Paolini will be the guest speaker at that meeting and he will be presenting a two day work shop on "Arts and Crafts" furniture construction on the following Saturday and Sunday. During the workshop Mr. Paolini will make and assemble a Morris arm chair, it should be a very informative work shop. Mike reminded everyone that it was our dues money that pays the cost of having someone come to speak at the club and host a work shop and by not participating in a work shop we were not taking full advantage of the dues we pay.

Program:

Without further ado the meeting was turned over to Bruce for his presentation on jigs. After a short break for refreshments Bruce demonstrated some of the many jigs he had developed and some commercial available one. Through out the night jigs that did just about everything from positioning a door lock, to cutting thin strips of wood safely was demonstrated.
