A Sampling of Historic Workbenches & Accessories

Subject: Rough to Ready
Speaker: Bill Anderson

Pizza & Wings for dinner prior to the meeting.

Bill Anderson of Edwards Mountain Woodworks, instructor at Roy Underhill's Woodwright's School, and TWA member. Will take us through the steps with hand tools, of taking a rough board to a board ready for a woodworking project. He will start with a scrub plane, move on to jack, jointer and smoother planes. Bill will use both bevel up and bevel down planes. He will use a square, winding stick, straight edge, marking gauge and panel gauge to dimension the wood. He will use a shooting board to square up the ends. He will talk about bevel up smoothers with high angle frog and different blade bevels.

A lot of chips will be generated with just a little sweat!

Subject: Subject: A Sampling of Historic Workbenches & Workbench Accessories
Speaker: Brian Coe



Brian Coe, Director of Interpretation at Old Salem and period furnituremaker, will provide a detailed look at eight historic workbenches in the Old Salem collection.

Heavily influenced by the Germanic heritage of the Moravian craftsmen who settled Salem, these workbenches show the progression of workbench design and technology over a 100 year span from 1760 to 1860. While period furnituremakers and neander woodworkers tend to drool over such benches, they can still provide design tips and features that can be used in modern workshops as well.

Brian will also be sampling some historic workbench accessories that are still used today in fine woodworking. Examples of the miter jack, shooting board, bench hooks, *donkey's ear* (don't know what that is?? Come and find out!) and secondary bench vises for tasks as varied as carving and dovetailing will be shown and demonstrated. Please note, although router jigs and tailed tools might be mocked, no power tools will be harmed during this presentation.

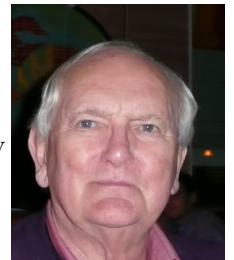

1. You need a flat surface for honing for flattening blades. Float plate glass (3/8” thick) or granite plates or MDF all provide a flat surface. Look at Lowes or Home Depot for their stone tiles. Beware of plates with plastic finishes however.
2. 6” grinders and 8” slow speed grinders actually differ only by about 20% in terms of fpm—not really enough to worry about.
3. Grinding wheels should be the soft bond type. Grit should be 36 or 60. Fine grits tend to burn the metal quicker because of increase friction.
4. For fixing sandpaper to a flat surface, use 3M 77 adhesive, which is peelable. 3M 90 is permanent.

Construct a fan back Windsor chair entirely with hand tools while honing tool skills and learning joinery techniques. Split a log, shape the crest and spindles with drawknives and spokeshaves, hollow the seat using inshaves and travishers, and assemble the chair using hand drills. Edwards Mountain Woodworks offers you the opportunity to learn specific handtool woodworking skills and techniques in a very focused but relaxed setting.

Whether you want to learn how to use handplanes, how to cut precise joinery by hand, or you just want to learn the ins and outs of handtools, there is something here for you.

Classes are limited to a maximum of 3 people and generally are intensive exercises on a topic, lasting one or two days from 9 am to 5 pm. Each student has their own workbench. A tool list and a class manual accompany each class. Generally, all tools and materials are supplied, though there may be an additional materials fee for some classes. Lunch is provided each day. Workshop prices are \$90 per day with a \$15 basic materials fee. Project oriented workshop have a materials fee that reflects the cost of the lumber and hardware.

Miter Plane and Shooting Board**Sept 3-5**

We will make a wooden miter plane based on one by the English firm of Routledge. The plane will have a low bed angle and a 10 degree skew on the blade. We will also make a shooting board for squaring up stock to use with this plane.

Traditional Toted Smoother.**Sept 10-12**

Make a close-handled coffin-shaped smoothing plane using traditional tools such as mortise chisels, floats, and curved rasps. Students will fit a traditionally forged plane blade and use the plane to smooth a panel

Queen Anne Footstool**Sept 27-Oct 2**

We will make a simple Queen Anne style footstool with hand cut pad feet. The stool will be made of mahogany with a polar upholstery frame. The legs will be cut with a turning saw, mallet and chisel, and back saw. Shaping will be with rasps and scrapers. The aprons will be hand rabbeted and molded and will be attached to the legs with mortise and tenon joinery. We will review other styles of cabriole legs (slipper, pad, trifid, Spanish foot, and ball and claw) and also review different styles of upholstery (traditional 18th century, and modern). Some experience with handcut mortise and tenon joinery needed.

Essential Sawyer's Tools**Oct 8-12**

We will make a 4 foot tall wooden sawyer's vise for sharpening handsaws and also a traditional English saw bench (based on Christopher Schwarz's design). One day will be devoted to handsaw sharpening and to developing handsaw and skills.

Workshop held in July, 2010



Our class was made of varying experience levels. The instruction was well developed so all felt competent to tackle the joinery in the hands on portion of the workshop. I believe everyone, including Will Neptune, walked away with something



they could use in their own shop.

"Kickers, runners, legs and drawers, how do you put a table together and why? Also, dividers, cases, moldings and bases, what works and what doesn't?" A.C.

"The process of creating the joinery by hand slows the action and forces you to understand why the wood and joint operate together as they do. Then machine tools can be used to speed the process." T.R.

"One that particularly struck me was that no matter what type of table you are making, the joinery is almost identical, Shaker, Queen Anne, or Contemporary, they all go together the same way." A.C.

Will's experience as a skilled craftsman and educator of woodworking was very evident in the way he started the class from the basics and then layered the many aspects and evolutions of the joinery." T.R.

"Another thing you couldn't miss was; Will is a friendly, funny guy who can really explain why mortise and tenon or twin tenons or why dovetails are in a particular place.

He can also tell you why some of the stuff in articles makes no sense. If you draw a layout line, why would you saw to "split the line"? You either cut away the line or leave the line depending on where you laid it out" A.C.

"If you were one of about 14 TWA members attending the Will Neptune workshop

at Mark Keglers' shop in Raleigh on July 17th and 18th, you learned all you ever wanted to know but didn't know who to ask about designing and building tables and case-work." A.C.
