# Workbench Show & Tell

Fifteen years ago, I built a "temporary" workbench. Meanwhile, I read endlessly about workbenches looking for an affordable yet capable design and finally got inspired with the book Workbenches by Christopher Schwarz. Recently I built this bench which is derived from a plan in that book.



This bench was built primarily from 2"x12"x16' southern yellow pine dimension lumber planed to a thickness of 1-1/4". The vise chops and planing stop are ash. The bench dogs were appropriately turned from scavenged dogwood. Several coats of boiled linseed oil were used for the finish. The bench top is 3-1/4" thick and approximately 2' x 5' with legs that are 5" square. It is solid and does not wiggle a bit during use! Note that the legs, sliding deadman, and top edge are all in the same plane for clamping versatility.

The joinery is mortise and tenon with drawbored pegs. Making these test joints early was helpful.



Each leg is glued up from four 1-1/4"x5" boards. Note that each leg mortise is formed automatically by making the center two boards 2" longer than the outer two boards. The tenons for the four stretchers were formed similarly.

The laminated bench top and the end-vise chops are quite conventional. The end vise is a Record vise clone made by Anant in India. Both the end vise and leg vise have leather-lined jaw faces which greatly increases their holding power.

Some things are just to large, bulky, and/ or heavy to cart to our monthly meeting to show. Thanks to Mike Payst who wanted to share his awesome bench - I am now accepting email Show and Tell. I encourage all to send me photos of your item and a detailed explanation, whatever you would like to share.

The leg vise and sliding deadman are shown here holding a walnut plank for edge jointing. Already the leg vise has become indispensable to me! The leg vise hardware is unconventional and is described below.



One day I was in a local Tractor Supply Store and spotted 1-8 threaded rod (that's 1" dia. and 8 threads/in.) and thought that it could be made into a decent vise screw. I also bought a 1-8 threaded rod coupler which became the 3 1/2" long vise nut epoxied into the bench leg. The business end is all made from ordinary hardware store items with a custom turned handle.



The dogwood handle is inside a 3/4" iron pipe tee. The other branch was drilled and tapped to 1-8 and the screw is solidly secured to the tee with threads, epoxy, and a spring pin. Next is a hardened thrust washer and a 3/16 mild steel plate. A 1-8 elastic stop jam nut serves as a garter to pull the chop back when opening the vise. The steel plate is secured to the chop with four 5/16 cap screws into brass threaded inserts.

Two short bushings cut from 1" Schedule 40 PVC pipe support the screw and the chop.



The adjustable planing stop also serves to hide the end grain of the bench top. Note the leather facings on the leg vise jaws.



The Anant end vise screw is 4 threads/inch thus its movable jaw moves 1/4" per turn of the handle. This leg vise moves only 1/8" per turn so twice as many turns are required for a given distance. However, the finer screw thread in the leg vise will hold most items with just a gentle snugging of the handle.

So far, this workbench is working very nicely for me and it was relatively inexpensive. The wood, leather, and hardware for this bench cost under \$200. I already had the Anant end vise which would have added about another \$100.


