Subject: Carcass & Drawer Design Speaker: Matt Hobbs Workshop: Saturday January 21, 2012

We are starting 2012 off with a great program featuring Matt Hobbs, a professional woodworker based in Durham. Matt will do a presentation at our membership meeting and then a one day workshop.

Matt grew up in the furniture trade under his father, Ben Hobbs (recipient of the 2010 Cartouche Award from SAPFM). After completing graduate studies in early American decorative arts at Winterthur museum, Matt worked and taught furniture-making classes with Ben in their eastern NC shop. Since moving to Durham in 2004, Matt has operated a "bespoke" workshop where he makes custom furniture to the buyers specifications. He has made custom pieces for clients throughout the eastern US, for individuals, design professionals and businesses. His focus is on early American styles; however, he embraces exploring more modern designs.

Matt's focus for our program will be on traditional drawer design and construction, a subject that most of us have had issues with, at one time or another. For the program, Matt will draw upon historic examples of drawer construction to show a variety of construction methods, including a variety in examples he has made. He will also have various pieces of his work for our review.

For the Saturday workshop, Matt will show the process for fitting drawers, step by step. He will start with a chest carcass and go through the process of making and fitting a drawer for a given opening, including the blocking, runners, kickers and stops. Workshop participants will have the opportunity to make and fit individual drawers to the carcass.

Chris Gochnour

November 2011 workshop

Chris Gochnour, a professional furniture maker, teacher and author from Utah spent the weekend with us on November 19/20/21. He talked about his working life

and built his handsome heritage tool chest.

On Friday Chris presented a slide show of a representative sampling of his work including a very fine oval desk built for the Utah State Governor's office using wood from trees downed during a local tornado. It seems that Chris' wife volunteered his services for the job and he did not get paid for it though he did receive further commissions from the Governor's office on the strength of the desk.

Chris started woodworking making skate boards for his own use (he was a State finalist in the sport) and then invested \$15 in an advertisement offering an arts & crafts chair he had made. The lady who responded to the advertisement subsequently ordered several more pieces from Chris. He has not advertised since relying solely on referrals. He has broadened his exposure considerably by authoring numerous articles for Fine Woodworking magazine & by regular teaching at the Mark Adams School of Woodworking, and the Salt Lake City Institute.

Chris clearly has an extensive knowledge and affection for hand planes. He discussed the attributes of bevel up and bevel down blades and the advantages of different bevel angles in relation to different wood surfaces. Cambering of plane iron edges was also explained.

Although Chris enjoys hand tools and uses them a lot, he made it clear that to maintain a livelihood producing about 12 commissioned pieces a year, the use of machines is essential.

The workshop was conducted in Roy Underhill's Woodwrights School in Pittsboro with 21 club members in attendance. Chris had earlier shipped a box of his favorite tools and essential jigs, and separately the western alder wood for the box. This wood looks and finishes very much like cherry and is a current favorite of cabinet makers in the west. Most of the material had been cut and machined to size and about half the dovetails had been cut. As Chris said, you can only watch so many dovetails being cut.

Chris hand planed every surface with his plane irons very finely set to produce whisper thin shavings. He does this on all his work apparently, needing only a light sanding after, depending on the finish. He clamped two opposite boards together to saw the dovetails taking pains to use hand clamps to minimize vibration. The boards were separated for removal of the waste by a coping saw and were individually placed in a 'base line paring jig' for paring to the line.

Some things are just to large, bulky, and/or heavy to cart to our monthly meeting to show. *email Show and Tell*. I encourage all to send me photos of your item and a detailed explanation, whatever you would like to share.

This jig was described in detail and Chris provided copies of a sketch showing the details of construction, (to be loaded on our web page). Incidentally, students attending his blanket box making class at the Mark Adams' school are required to make such a jig and bring it with them.

Chris did not advocate paring or fine tuning the sides of the dovetails, rather he required accurate sawing to one side or the other of the scribed line. He places great emphasis on accurate sawing and recommends frequent practice. He used a scalpel to mark pins from tails and achieved a firm hand push fit from his sawn surfaces. Throughout the exercise Chris discussed the construction and use of each tool he employed and invited attendees to perform various operations.

One major advantage of using the Woodwrights School was the

ability to use the hand held video camera and large flat screen monitor. The camera was mounted on the end of a billet of wood which enabled it to be inserted up close to the marking and cutting operations. Roy initially operated the camera and then the task was taken over by Bill Anderson who did a magnificent job of capturing every operation in close detail. This feature added tremendously to everyone's enjoyment of the workshop.

The base of the box was rabetted to fit grooves in the box sides and ends and again members were invited to use the particular hand planes for the operations. Gluing up the box concluded Saturday's work.

Sunday was devoted to making the lid and the mitered moldings

for the box. The lid frame was grooved and fitted using mortise and tenon joints which were secured by draw bored pins and no glue. The process was fully explained as it was demonstrated.

The lid panel had not been cut or machined to size and Chris demonstrated how to 'four square' the panel using hand tools. The panel was dimensioned from the frame and sized using a hand saw and was thicknessed by means of a fore plane, a jointer, and a smoothing plane. It was than grooved to suit the frame and radiused for appearance. Members were involved in all the operations.

The miter joints for the top and bottom rails and the lid molding were sawn and planed using a miter jig that Chris had made and the rails and moldings were finished by attendees using a wooden beading plane and an ogee molding plane in specialized jigs that Chris had brought.

The final hour was a little frantic in an effort to complete the box but this was achieved within the deadline.

Chris presented the box to the club members present and it was decided to raffle it among the attendees, all of whom had participated in its construction. The delighted winner of the raffle was Greg Westmoreland

who asked Chris to autograph his new box and has the job of adding hardware and finishing as appropriate. Greg may be persuaded to bring the finished box to 'show and tell' one evening.

Everyone appreciated Chris' friendly and open style of demonstration and explanation; his craftsmanship and love of woodworking were most evident. The opportunity for hands on involvement in the several processes was regarded as most valuable.
