# Topic: Woodworking Applications and Routers



#### (meeting minutes: James Sapp)

Roy Brookhart opened the general meeting conducted using Zoom virtual technology. There were 30 members in attendance. There were no new members or guests attending.

Fred noted that several members, who have participated in TFT work teams in the past, have not been able to work this year because they don't have their own workshops.

Joe Sabo said there are 10 volunteers who have agreed to make VWs in their shops, and that the materials would be available for pickup at Klingspor parking lot on Sunday, October 4th. If anyone else is interested in working on this project, contact Joe (sabojc12@gmail.com).

Cecil and Patti Raynor and Hugh Fish graciously opened their shops for inspection. The Raynor's shop is quite large, having multiple workstations, tools and quite a bit of wood storage. Cecil and Patti showed collaborative wood and glass projects they are making for the bar in their cabin in the mountains. Contrastingly, Hugh Fish's shop is small, measuring 12' by 24' attached to the garage. Having limited space, Hugh has positioned his tools and work stations strategically to get the maximum benefit of the space. Hugh has made over 80 furniture pieces, many of which are in his home and more he has made for friends and customers. Hugh took

us on a tour of his home to show many of the fine quality pieces of furniture he has built.

Roy concluded the program by asking for ideas on how to get more members to join the Zoom meetings. He noted that when we were meeting at Klingspor, roughly 55 members would attend, but now we are seeing about 30 members at the Zoom meetings. We are concerned about losing membership during this Covid-19 time. Some folks indicated that they weren't getting meeting announcements, despite the email notices that are being sent out. One possibility for not receiving notices is that membership may have lapsed. Also, concern was expressed that some members may not do well with email communication methods. Further follow-up on these items is planned.

# TWA GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING—SEPTEMBER 15, 2020 TOOLS AND TECHNIQUES FOR RIVEN LEGS — CARA O'CONNELL

#### (meeting minutes: James Sapp)

Cara O'Connell, the features speaker, has been whittling and working with wood for many years, having developed an interest in woodworking when she was a child. Cara was the first woman to become a certified Journeyman Carpenter in Northern Virginia in the 1980's. She started whittling spoons, animal shapes and canes while in Pennsylvania working with an Amish crew renovating an old farmhouse. After taking a class with Barron at the Piedmont Earth Skills Gathering at Shakori Hills last spring, she picked it back up and has turned her attention to Swedish carving techniques, learning from Peter Follansbee. She currently is a practicing physical therapist, although woodworking is her passion that she hopes to soon dedicate full time.

Cara came to us live via Zoom at Roy Underhill's shop where she demonstrated the hand tools and techniques she uses to make benches and chairs. The video presentation was recorded. Some of the key tools involved with the making of slab and stick furniture (Windsor chairs, benches, etc.) included a bowl adze, froe, axe, tapered tenon reamer, tenon cutter, hand saw, brace and bit, bevel gauges, drawknife, and shaving horse. The slab is drilled at specified angles to the legs and spindles using brace and bit. The holes are then tapered by reaming. The legs and spindles are taken from split wood pieces, riven with a froe and shaped with the drawknife at the shaving horse. Tenons are then formed and tapered to connect with the holes drilled in the slab. Cara prefers working with green wood but sometimes uses dried material. Typical woods used in construction are white pine, elm, hickory, ash, butternut, sycamore, catalpa, cherry

## UPCOMING MEETING

#### Meeting Topic: Introduction to the Shaper Origin

Date: Tuesday, November 17

Speaker: Roland Johnson

Roland Johnson describes his start in woodworking as "a bit inauspicious"—he built an 8-ft. racing boat at the tender age of 14 and it sank the first two times he put it in the water. His woodworking has since advanced, and he's now turned to teaching as a way of paying his hard-earned knowledge forward. A contributing editor to *Fine Woodworking* magazine, he recently completed a series of online video classes for Taunton Workshops, available at *tauntonworkshops.com*. He is also a featured presenter with The Woodworking Shows.

Almost two years ago at the Baltimore Woodworking Show (2018) the folks from Shaper brought their new handheld CNC router, the Origin, for a one-show unveiling. Rollie was awe-struck by its capabilities and could hardly wait to get his hands on one to see if the machine could really be an asset in a real-world shop. It is. In spades! And a person doesn't have to learn CAD to operate one!

This presentation is designed to introduce folks to the capabilities of the Origin and the basic operation of the machine. With its ability to work on virtually any size piece and its ease of programming, the Origin is an ideal shop companion for anyone who needs to perform very precise joinery, inlay, or accurate repetitive parts production.

## TOYS FOR TOTS UPDATE

I have been spending this afternoon trying to contact as many of the workshop hosts as possible.

As you turn your toys into the Marine Corps please make sure you hold one out of each type you're making to present at the ZOOM meeting.
