Topic: Introduction to the Shaper Origin

Roland Johnson describes his start in woodworking as "a bit inauspicious"—he built an 8-ft. racing boat at the tender age of 14 and it sank the first two times he put it in the water. His woodworking has since advanced, and he's now turned to teaching as a way of paying his hard-earned knowledge forward. A contributing editor to *Fine Woodworking* magazine, he recently completed a series of online video classes for Taunton Workshops, available at *tauntonworkshops.com*. He is also a featured presenter with The Woodworking Shows.


Almost two years ago at the Baltimore Woodworking Show (2018) the folks from Shaper brought their new handheld CNC router, the Origin, for a one-show unveiling. Rollie was awe-struck by its capabilities and could hardly wait to get his hands on one to see if the machine could really be an asset in a real-world shop. It is. In spades! And a person doesn't have to learn CAD to operate one!

This presentation is designed to introduce folks to the capabilities of the Origin and the basic operation of the machine. With its ability to work on virtually any size piece and its ease of programming, the Origin is an ideal shop companion for anyone who needs to perform very precise joinery, inlay, or accurate repetitive parts production.

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TWA GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING—OCTOBER 20, 2020

Roy Brookhart opened the general meeting conducted using Zoom virtual technology. There were 39 members in attendance. One guest, Frank Fee, joined the meeting.

Joe Sabo reminded Toys for Tots work leaders that they will need to make a reservation with the Marine Corps to deliver their toys. Toys need to be delivered by the first week in December but may be delivered at any time, if they are ready. Joe reported that the materials for the VW cars were delivered to 10 volunteers for completion. Three sets have been finished to date.

To conclude this year's shop crawl series, Frank Empie showed his 18' by 24', timber frame shop. The wood used in building the shop came from Frank's property that he cut and milled. Of particular note, Frank showed his recently completed hickory workbench that he is very pleased with. Electrical service came from his house to a new subpanel in the shop. He has both 110v and 220v service drops to his equipment.

The number of people attending the meeting was 39, the highest it has

been since the beginning of virtual meetings. Roy continues to urge members to help those who might need assistance in setting up and using Zoom to attend meetings. Members are reminded that they can share wood project pictures on the web site. Contact Paul Holzworth to post the pictures.

WOODWORKING APPLICATIONS AND ROUTERS — JIM HEAVEY

The featured speaker for the meeting was Jim Heavy. As a craftsman and educator for WOOD Magazine since 1996, Jim has had projects and articles featured in the magazine and has designed and presented educational programs nationally. He represents WOOD Magazine as a spokesman and presenter at The Woodworking Shows as well as an educator at WOOD Magazine's Weekend With WOOD. Jim is also an instructor for Craftsy, an online educational provider. Jim has taught both individual and group woodworking classes at his shop and throughout the country. His main joy is producing furniture for his family.

Jim's presentation started with a description of types of routers and their sizes. Starting with trim routers that typically have a 1 HP motor, they can do many jobs that the larger routers perform. These smaller routers only come with a 1/4-inch collet as they are not meant for large router bits. The mid-range power

routers typically have a 2 to 2 ¼ HP motor and can have fixed or plunge bases that can be interchanged. Most come with variable speed motors ranging from 8000 to 25000 rpm. Lower speeds are used with larger bits to keep the tip speed consistent with their intended use. These mid-size routers are the

recommended size for most woodworkers. The largest routers have 3 to 3 ½ HP motors, are heavy to handle and are better suited for a router table. Many routers have a soft-start feature that aids in control and puts less stress on the router motor and bearings. Collets come in ¼ and ½ inch sizes.

WOODWORKING APPLICATIONS AND ROUTERS — JIM HEAVEY (CONTINUED)

For mid-sized routers, Jim recommends using 1/2 inch diameter router bits. Despite their somewhat higher cost, Jim recommends buying router bits from companies who produce higher quality bits. There are six basic router bit styles: straight, rabbeting, chamfer, round over, cove and pattern bits. Another versatile bit is the Roman ogee bit that can produce 6 different profiles. Straight bits come with different cutting-edge configurations such as shear cutting or spiral in upcutting and downcutting modes. Routers can be outfitted with guide bushings that are useful in routing with templates. The guide bushing design can vary according to the brand of router. Jim recommends to users of Porter Cable guides to add an O-ring to prevent the knurled nut from coming loose during routing operations.

Jim offered several tips in using routers. Don't overtighten router collets when installing bits. Also, make sure there is a gap, about 1/8", between the collet and the base of the router bit. Using a ½ or 1/4 inch O-ring on the router bit shaft can help maintain the gap. Use the variable speed control of the router as the bit size changes. Larger bits require slower speeds to keep the velocity at the tip at intended cutting rate. Feed speed is important to the quality of cut; too fast will bog down the router giving poor cuts; too slow can result in burning of the wood, especially in maple and cherry.

Hand-held routing is performed from left to right because the bit is turning clockwise. Router table operations are performed from right to left as the router is

inverted and the bit is observed from above the table to be turning counterclockwise. Performing routing in the opposite direction is called climb cutting. This method can be dangerous as the router will likely abruptly travel in the direction of the climb cut when hand-held or the material being routed on router table can be kicked back at the user. Sometimes, climb cutting is unavoidable especially when the grain direction of wood will lead to chip out when routing in the recommended direction. In these cases, when climb cutting take very light passes and then make the final pass in the proper cutting direction.

Burning can occur for a number of reasons such as too slow a feed rate, dull bits and too high a bit speed rate, and this occurs more often in maple and cherry. For situations where burning has occurred, Jim recommends dabbing the burned area with a Q-tip moistened with water and then using the router bit as a scraper to remove the burn blemish.

Jim shared some of the router jigs he uses frequently. They included a dado jig using a pattern bit, a trammel jig, a mortising jig using a 3/4" guide bushing, a coping jig for the router table and a small parts jig for the router table.

After his presentation, Jim showed us around his shop.
