

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)


Roy Brookhart opened the general meeting conducted using Zoom virtual technology. There were 33 members in attendance.

Presentation of toys from the toy makers will be the subject of the December meeting to be held by Zoom on December 15th.

Bob Gabor presented his very well equipped and clean shop. His shop features a centralized Oneida dust collector connected to all his stationary tools. Tools include two back-toback table saws (one being a Saw Stop), multiple bandsaws and sanders, two planers, a drum sander, a multi-

router, router table and his latest grand addition of a 12" Oliver jointer. Bob has a separate room where he does vacuum press veneering. Great thanks go to Bob for his excellent presentation.

INTRODUCTION TO THE SHAPER ORIGIN—ROLAND JOHNSON

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)

The featured speaker was Rollie Johnson. Rollie describes his start in woodworking as "a bit inauspicious"-he built an 8-ft. racing boat at the tender age of 14 and it sank the first two times he put it in the water. His woodworking has since advanced, and he's now turned to teaching as a way of paying his hard-earned knowledge forward. A contributing editor to Fine Woodworking magazine, he recently completed a series of online video classes for Taunton Workshops, available at tauntonworkshops.com. He is also a featured presenter with The Woodworking Shows.

Two years ago at the Baltimore Woodworking Show (2018) the folks from Shaper Tools brought their new handheld CNC router, the Origin, for a one-show unveiling. Rollie was awe-struck by its capabilities and could hardly wait to get his hands on one to see if the machine could be an asset in a real-world shop. Based on his experience, Rollie claims that the Origin is the most revolutionary

hand held that he has ever come across. He likens it to a plunge router with built-in templates. The user doesn't have to learn CAD to operate the device. His presentation introduced us to Origin's capabilities and basic operation. With its ability to work on virtually any size piece

and its ease of programming, the Origin is an ideal shop companion for anyone who needs to perform very precise joinery, inlay, or accurate repetitive parts production. Shaper tools is owned by the same company that owns Festool and Saw Stop.

INTRODUCTION TO THE SHAPER ORIGIN— ROLAND JOHNSON (CONTINUED)

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)

The Origin is a hand-held two axis (X and Y) CNC device. The Z axis (vertical) is manually controlled by the operator. The device is a plunge router with an on-board computer and camera. The user moves the Origin over the work area, using its camera to scan special shapes, called dominos, to tell the computer where to work. After scanning the work area, the user provides the design of the part it is to make. The designs can be imported on a USB thumb drive or downloaded from Shaper Tools (www.shapertools.com). The Origin also has built-in design capabilities for simple shapes. Once the scan and design are complete, the user operates the Origin by following the design pattern on the computer screen. The Origin presents a crosshair in a circle icon on the computer screen that the user uses to guide the router over the design. As long as the

pattern is in within the aiming circle, the Origin controls the router bit and cutting occurs. If the user drifts out of the pattern area, the device will quickly raise the bit and stop cutting. There is about a 5/8-inch degree of freedom that the user has to keep the Origin in the pattern area.

The Origin excels in its accuracy with better than 1/1000 of an inch. This allows for very precise routing for difficult to install items such as Soss hinges. The area in which the Origin can operate is only restricted by the area covered by the dominos, which is almost limitless given that multiple domino tapes can be applied to the work area. Based on his experience, Rollie says that within two hours one can be using the Origin competently. During the presentation, Rollie showed pictures of himself using the Origin to make a box. Cutting the box joints was much more precise

compared with traditional methods of making these joints.

The Origin has a 1 HP motor, so single pass heavy deep routing is not possible. The maximum collet size is 8mm. Rollie uses 1/8" and 1/4" collets and router bits (mostly up cut spiral bits) in his Origin. The maximum size router bit that the base plate can accommodate is 1inch. The Shaper Origin is priced at \$2500. The Shaper Tools web site provides much more information and instruction on the Origin. On every Thursday, Shaper Tools conducts a "Shaper Session" on You-Tube featuring a specific way of using the Origin. Rollie indicated that this coming Thursday's session is about cutting dovetails on the Origin.

After the presentation, Rollie graciously showed the audience his shop.

UPCOMING MEETING

Meeting Topic: Updates to 17th & 18th Century Woodworking - Evolution of Woodworking Techniques

Speaker: Chuck Bender **Date**: Tuesday, January 19

Charles (Chuck) Bender, aspiring podcaster, is one of the most highly regarded furniture makers in the country and the founder of the Acanthus Workshop. He began woodworking (seriously) at the age of 12 in his parents' basement, making pieces of furniture for friends and family. Chuck studied under Werner Duerr at the Central Chester County Vocational Technical School (now called the Center for the Arts and Technology) in Pennsylvania. Werner taught his high school program exactly like his apprenticeship in Germany. The students were instructed to blend hand tool use with power tools. Chuck teaches that same philosophy today.

After graduation from high school, Chuck began working for other cabinet makers to hone his skills. Having spent nearly ten years working with Irion Company Furnituremakers, working his way up to head of case and chair production, Chuck decided to branch off on his own. Since 1991 Chuck has built a reputation for making the highest quality 18th Century furniture in the country. His work can be seen in museums, private collections, and at some of the finest juried craft shows in the country. Chuck has received numerous woodworking awards throughout his career and has been featured in local and national magazines and newspapers.

In 2007, Chuck added the title "woodworking mentor" to his list of accomplishments by starting the Acanthus Workshop (a school for avocational woodworkers). Also, in 2007, he began sharing his knowledge publicly by writing articles for Popular Woodworking Magazine and teaching skill-driven classes at woodworking shows across the country.

In 2014, Chuck joined the staff of *Popular Woodworking* Magazine as Senior Editor but left nearly two years later to start an online magazine. Realizing his true passion resides in the workshop, either building furniture or teaching others, he exited the online venture and reestablished himself as a teacher and furniture maker in 2017.
