Topic: Clamp Down Before You Screw It Up

Ron Herman specializes in restoration of historic and antique properties using period methods and tools. Much of Ron's woodworking knowledge comes from his progression through a formal

apprenticeship to attain the rank of Master. Imparting knowledge is one of Ron's special skills. He's been instructing in one form or another on many different topics for more than 35 years.

Have you ever worked on a project based on a set of plans only to find out things weren't going the way you had expected? Zoom in with Ron Herman as he provides information about clamps, glues and fasteners project plans expect you to already know before you follow their instructions, complete with demonstrations and show-and-tell items.

Ron will also help you learn about the proper uses of different kinds and gauges of nails and screws, what countersink to use and how they coordinate with your nails, which clamps are appropriate for your uses/different species of wood and how to protect your project when using them, which woods require pilot holes for screws, and more, to greatly improve the success of your project.

SEQUENTIAL CONSTRUCTION OF BUILDING PROJECTS - STEVE LATTA

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)

At the September meeting, Steve Latta conducted a presentation on sequential construction of building projects. Most woodworkers have an idea as to what needs to happen to complete a project, but the sequence of the milling and cutting is another matter altogether. In tonight's presentation Steve demonstrated how the sequencing of milling, cutting and assembly of lumber to build a small, single drawer nightstand produces a streamlined and surgical approach to the building process.


Contrary to what many might do, Steve makes the tabletop last. If made first, it would become a place where parts, tools and other stuff might be laid making it susceptible to possible damage. In addition, early milling the lumber for the top to a rough thickness may also not present the real, final figure of the wood and hence, the best way to arrange the material for gluing up the top.

Looking at the cut-list, Steve identifies all the pieces, both primary and secondary woods, of the same thickness and mills them at one time. Cutting to length is postponed until all of the milling of the parts is completed. Extra pieces are milled at the same time to provide set-up pieces and spares for downstream joinery.

The faces of legs are identified and


marked with crayon where the mortises and tapers will be placed. The mortises are cut using a plunge router with the help of a jig. The legs are cut to length and then tapered. The blades and the aprons (and legs) are cut to length using a cross-cut sled (with a fresh fence face to minimize tear out) on the table saw. He uses a shop-made flip stop to make sure pieces have consistent lengths. Steve places the inside faces and edges against the sled fence and base so that any tear out will be only be exposed on the faces on the inside of the table. Also, in cutting the pieces to length, Steve rotates (as opposed to flipping) the squared edge to the flip stop thereby keeping any tear out on the inside edge and face.

The next step in the process is establishing the shoulder-to-shoulder distance of the blades and aprons. It is vital to maintaining the squareness of the table that the shoulder-toshoulder dimensions of the front and back pieces (blades and rear apron) are identical, and similarly for the left and right-side aprons and kicker. He finds the right set-up for the tenon shoulder and then processes all of the pieces that have the same shoulder to shoulder distance. After getting all of the critical shoulder dimensions set, Steve then cuts the tenons to the proper thickness using a shop-made jig that attaches to the table saw fence.



Regarding the top, Steve mills the lumber to within a 1/32" of final thickness before glue-up. This way he can see the real character of the wood. He also makes the top about an inch longer in length and width. Before detailing the edge, Steve sands the top through 220 grit. Doing this first prevents possible rounding of the edges that would destroy the edge detail.

Steve highlighted some of the shopmade jigs used to process parts for the table. These jigs include the tenoning jig used on the table saw, a router jig for mortising, and a bench clamping fixture to mark and cut the dovetail slot on the upper blade. Overall, Steve delivered a very interesting and informative presentation.
