The meeting will be conducted using both Zoom and in person at Klingspor's. No special advance registration is required for the May meeting.



TWA GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING—APRIL 19, 2022

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)

The regular April meeting was conducted on Zoom. Thirty-six people attended. There were several guests attending mostly from the North Carolina Woodworkers. New member, Rod Branken, was present.

Barton Meeks summarized the current incentive program for bringing in new members. First, there will be a quarterly drawing (starting second quarter of this year) for a \$50 gift card at local woodworking stores for any member who brings in a new member. Chances of winning will increase if multiple new members are recruited in the quarter. At the end of the year, if a member has brought 3 or more new members, the member will get one year's free membership.

The next two meetings will be held at Klingspors' with Zoom attendance available for those who cannot attend in-person. We continue to seek speakers for future meetings.

TWA GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING — APRIL 19, 2022

FURNITURE DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION — GARRETT HACK

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)

The April meeting presentation was given by Garrett Hack. Host Jeff Leimberger introduced Garrett to the Zoom audience. Coming live from his shop in Vermont, Garrett described his background and surroundings. Having been associated with woodworking for almost fifty years, Garrett has advanced his craft from simpler designs starting in the Shaker traditions evolving to one-of-a-kind pieces of art that serve high-end clients. One of the key objectives in his design process is to produce pieces that draw the attention of observers across a room. Garrett includes unique features in his pieces that intrigues further exploration. On many pieces Garrett incorporates secret compartments or drawers promoting even more curiosity for his clients and observers.

Garrett provided a slide show of several foundation pieces that trace his evolving woodworking talents and endeavors.
He started with a
Shaker inspired
table, with a
surprise drawer,
leading to another
version with a
curly yellow birch
top and
asymmetrical
design. Federal
style influenced
Garrett's design
and creation of a

Demilune table with inlay accents of mother of pearl and abalone. Moving on in time and ingenuity, Garrett produced a curved table with walnut legs capped with solid silver stockings. A further evolution of the table included gold plate leg stockings and rippled aprons of yellow birch.

Garrett names all of his pieces and one of the next ones he presented was called "Ripplicious" that featured a desk with rippled sides.



Lately, Garrett has been making pieces that feature coopered sides. Garrett discussed at length the design and construction of two pieces that he is currently working on: a hanging curved cabinet based on curved staves and beading done with a scratch stock and a curvy desk with 12 drawers and secret compartments.

Garrett touched on some features of the design, construction choices, and process. To help visualize and understand the practicality of his design, Garrett makes use of smallscale models. These models also help with communication of the design to his clients. Many of his pieces have curved legs, some of which move in multiple directions, so Garrett uses templates to layout and shape them. Garrett keeps a wood sample piece in his shop and throughout the seasons he takes measurement on changes in its dimensions. This practice gives him the information he needs to have to properly size drawer sides and faces for the time of the year he is making them.

FURNITURE DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION — GARRETT HACK, CONTINUED

When asked about how he finishes his pieces, Garrett said he primarily uses multiple thin coats of shellac, upwards of 12 coats. If the piece will be potentially exposed to alcohol, he will apply multiple thin coats of varnish onto the shellac. Garrett explained that he levels his finish coats using a scraper (with no hook) and doesn't use sandpaper.

Garrett gave the audience a tour of his shop, which he built by himself

and patterned it to look like a mill. He uses typical machinery to shape his parts but where the final magic happens is at his bench with hand tools. Interestingly, Garrett also farms his land. Readers are encouraged to visit the TWA website where they will be able to view Garrett's presentation and be prepared to be amazed at his pieces of art.
