NOVEMBER FEATURED SPEAKER - BOB BEHNKE

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)

The November meeting presentation was given by Bob Behnke. The presentation was recorded and will be available in the members-only section of the TWA website.

Kerry Schoolfield introduced Bob Behnke, the Technical Service Manager for Titebond Adhesives. Bob's phone number is on the back of every bottle of Titebond glue.

Other than hide and cyanoacrylate varieties, Titebond woodworking glues are primarily PVA (polyvinyl acetate) suspensions in water. On a microscopic level, the glue particles are tiny spheres suspended in water. As the water evaporates, the glue particles get closer together and eventually a plastic film attaches to the wood.

During the gluing process, some of the water from the glue evaporates, but some is absorbed into the wood. Properties of wood that affect glue performance and selection include wood density and hardness, moisture content, wood movement, how the board was cut from the tree (i.e. plane, quarter or rift sawn), and contaminants such as pitch, oils, surface contaminants and wood extracts.

Wood density and hardness influence glue strength. The moisture content of the wood should be between 6% and 17%. The moisture content of the wood can lead to differential expansion between the wood and the glue line leading to glue ridges appearing after the moisture equilibrates. Wood will move with moisture but the glue will not, resulting in the appearance of ridges. Sanding immediately upon unclamping is not recommended because wood movement is not finished yet. To be sure that the wood

is stable after glue-up, Titebond recommends waiting a week before sanding. In-house testing has shown sanding after 24 hours presents 50% probability of glue line ridge appearance. Waiting 3 days reduces the probability to 10%. Note that hide glue expands and contracts with moisture making the appearance of a glue line ridge much less unlikely. Because PVA glues bond to cellulose, surface contaminants, oils and burn marks prevent the glue from adhering to the wood. These contaminants should be removed before glue-up. Acetone is a good solvent for removing oil and other contaminants.

Titebond I has a shelf life of about 10 years and Titebond II and II have shelf lives of about 4/5 years. If the glue has a vinegar smell, it has gone bad.

Application of PVA glues involves open time that is defined as the time between first application and when the glue starts to set (called the putty point). For Titebond I and II, the open assembly time is 5 minutes, and the total assembly time is 10 to 15 minutes. For Titebond III, open time is 8 to 10 minutes with a total assembly time of 20 to 25 minutes. Recommended clamping pressure is 100-125 psi for softwoods, 150-175 psi for medium woods and 175-200 psi for hardwoods. Glue clean-up may be done with a wet rag, scraping the squeeze-out after 20 minutes or scraping and sanding after removal from clamps. Surfaces being glued should be sanded to 220 grit.

There are five steps to be followed for successful glue-ups:

1. Prior to assembly, have clamps ready and close by. Note the order of assembly. If using iron pipe clamps, mask the pipe where





it will contact the glue to eliminate stains in the wood. Mask-off or pre-finish areas where glue squeeze-out would affect the performance of wood finishes.

2. Select the right glue for the job. In assembling joints, determine where and how much glue should be applied. For example, on mortise and tenon joints, PVA glues will swell the wood that will later (in a couple of years) shrink as it dries causing the joint to become loose. Using a non-water-based glue such as epoxy would eliminate that issue plus provide more open time in assembling the project. On dovetail joints, glue application should be made only to keep the joint from coming apart. Dovetails provide a strong mechanical joint.
3. The glue and the wood must be above the minimum temperature (chalk point) for the glue to perform. Typically chalk temperatures are about 50°F.
4. Have clean-up tools and supplies at hand to remove squeeze-out. Remove the masking tape used to protect the wood from squeeze-out after the glue starts to harden.
5. Clamp for at least two hours.
