Topic: Annual Toys for Tots Dinner



TWA GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING—NOVEMBER 21, 2023

The November meeting was held at Klingspor's Woodworking Shop in Cary and on Zoom.

Approximately 18 people were present with 7 more on Zoom.

Jim Creasman, our featured speaker was a guest. Deneen Hitchcock attended as a guest.

Kerry Schoolfield served as the meeting emcee. Kerry previewed upcoming meetings early next year with the first being held at Rockler's new store in Cary in January. Kerry expects the Rockler meeting to be similar to the one we had recently at Woodcraft. For the February meeting at Klingspor's, Wild Edge Woodcraft will discuss milling,

drying and wood storage. They will also discuss live edge river tables.

George Mills agreed to be the resource to store the three benchtop drill presses that are used at the Klingspor's toy build held every December. Mike Payst is currently doing this and is in need of reducing his shop content.

Joe Sabo shared that many toys have already been delivered to the Marine Corps for Toys for Tots. Joe expects the final count of toys to exceed 6000 again.

NOVEMBER FEATURED PRESENTATION - BUILDING A SPICE BOX

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)

Kerry Schoolfield introduced the speaker for the November meeting, Jim Creasman. The presentation was video recorded and is available for viewing on the TWA website.

Jim's presentation centered around building a William and Mary era spice box. While Jim's spice box was made in the style of the William and Mary period, others have made versions in period styles such as Chippendale, Duncan Phyfe and others. The popularity of spice boxes waned after about 50 years except in the area in and around Philadelphia. Hence, today the spice boxes are called Pennsylvania spice boxes. Jim's work on the spice box was featured in the Society of American Period Furniture Maker's (SAPFM) annual publication in 2022.

Jim followed the philosophy that form follows process, as he set about to make his spice box using the methods and tools of the time. This approach offered a significant challenge to his woodworking skills plus in many circumstances required him to duplicate the tools used back when the spice boxes were made.



Using a slide presentation plus the actual spice box, Jim started with describing how he made the case and its internal compartments and boxes. The case was made of walnut with quarter sawn sycamore side panels. The case sides, tops and bottoms were joined by dovetails. Layout was performed with a panel

gauge. Dadoes cut into the cases were hand cut using a kerf saw, chisels and a router plane. The back panel is removable and indeed provides access to one of the three hidden drawers in the case. Jim used various moulding planes to form the edges of the drawer dividers and mouldings. Many of the moulding planes that Jim used were either refurbished or had to be made from scratch to obtain the shapes he was seeking. Jim referred to Bill Anderson's video on refurbishing hand planes and cited Larry Williams' reference on making hand planes. He also recommended Matt Bickford's work on moulding planes.

After discussing the case construction, Jim focused on the process of building the drawer boxes. These were made from a secondary hardwood with the face veneered with quarter-sawn sycamore. Joinery was throughdovetails on the back corners and half-blinds on the front. The bottom was a thin piece of cedar. The drawers slide on the bottoms. Knobs for the drawers were turned from walnut.

Discussion turned to making of the door. The frame for the door panel was made with wedged throughtenons. The walnut door panel was constructed to fit into the frame and then was inlaid with quartersawn sycamore, cheery and holly. A line and berry pattern was used in the inlay process. Jim made some of the inlay tools and supplemented them with those he obtained from Lie-Nielsen to complete this work. The hinge and locking mechanism were purchased from Horton Brasses. Jim made the escutcheon piece for the keyhole out of brass.

Jim finished the piece with 15 coats of shellac, applying three coats at a time between sanding. All of the glue up was done with hide glue, both hot and liquid Old Brown glue. Jim purchased his shellac through shellac finishes.com.

Overall, Jim's presentation was awe-inspiring and a real testimony to Jim's woodworking skills and inventiveness. Viewing the video is highly recommended if you were unable to attend the meeting or want to go back and review it.
