
Topic: Favorite Jigs of TWA Members

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TWA GENERAL MEMBERSHIP MEETING—MARCH 29, 2024 TOM MCLAUGHLIN—GRAIN GRAPHICS

(meeting minutes: James Sapp)

The March meeting was held on Friday afternoon, preceding the all-day Saturday workshop by master craftsman Tom McLaughlin on chair making. The meeting began at 4PM in Klingspor's Cary store. Nearly 30 people attended at Klingspor's and a few more on Zoom.

Roy announced that the club has been getting more requests for disposing of woodworking equipment and need to get the message out to members who might be interested. For the time being we are planning to have the TWA Webmaster send out email notices for these items. Members should also note that there is a Classified section in the Members area on the website, where Ray Essington recently posted a 6-inch Delta jointer and a bench top mortising machine for sale.

A raffle was held for a \$25 gift certificate to Woodcraft but nobody seems to remember who won.

Kerry Schoolfield announced that for the next meeting, Cecil Raynor will be hosting a discussion of favorite woodworking jigs. The meeting will be held at Klingspor's on April 16. Cecil is looking for members to volunteer to show their favorite jigs.

The featured speaker for the Friday afternoon meeting was Tom McLaughlin assisted by his wife, Kris, who did much of the video production. The entire presentation was recorded and will be on the TWA website. Tom and Kris provided some introductory information about the *Epic Woodworking* website, the Neighborwood and the weekly Shop Night Live on YouTube every Thursday at 8PM. Tom showed a scaled model of a classic workbench that he has been building as an Epic Woodworking project with students

who have signed onto the course.

For the Friday afternoon meeting, Tom discussed "Grain Graphics", or dealing with and using the wood grain properties in creating wood pieces. First, Tom focused on looking at the microscopic nature of wood, looking at the end, edge and face grains of a board. In the microscopic world, one can see the wood cellular structure, which resembles straws, showing as hollow tubes in the end grain and long, thin-walled structures in the edge grain. On the face of boards, the cellular nature of highly figured woods such as flame birch or curly maple present alternating end and edge views of the wood grain.

Knowledge of grain direction is important to obtaining pleasing results. When gluing of up panels, the face grain can be arranged to conceal glue lines and to present a pleasing appearance by using slip matching, reversing the board, and book matching strategies. However, attention to the board's edge grain is equally important. If, in arranging boards for glue-up, the edge grain of one board is going in the opposite direction of the other board, the face of the board will end-up looking darker on one side and lighter on the other because light is being reflected differently by each board's edge grain direction. Using edge and face grain properties of some high figured woods can lead to some striking appearances as Tom demonstrated with some samples of flame birch and curly maple.

Using information about the end grain and face grain can provide some interesting effects when the board is sawn with curvature. For example, using knowledge of how the grain would flow when cutting an




Tom's Friday afternoon presentation covered grain graphics. (photo: Roy Brookhart)

arched face on a board, can lead to a draping or arching face appearance that could be used to advantage in table aprons. When cutting a curved leg, such as a cabriole leg, using the knowledge of how the end grain will travel through the leg after it is cut will result in a pleasing look, i.e. grain following the curvature of the leg. If not done correctly, however, the grain direction will counteract the curvature of the leg, resulting in a less than desirable result. Tom demonstrated these techniques in the presentation.

Another technique is to utilize alternating end and face grain to present an attractive pattern. Tom showed some examples of patterns he has been working with using veneers. Tom also has been developing some three-dimensional textures by pillowing the pieces he uses in his patterns.

Tom ended the presentation with a slide show of the outstanding furniture pieces that he and other woodworking crafters have made using the principles of grain graphics.
